Our advice can restore to someone the ability to pour a kettle, take a shower, or travel to the shops. We understand that more people are afraid of losing their independence than of dying, and view a care home as a last, not first, resort.

Why we need your help even more in the future

The UK's population is changing fast. There are now more people over 65 than under 18, and the fastest growing age group is those aged 80 and above. This means that the demand for the DLF's services is likely to increase significantly throughout the next decade.

Falls are a particular danger for older people. Yet the majority could easily be avoided with simple home modifications or walking aids. By contacting the DLF, enquirers can be sure of receiving caring advice that is expert, impartial and tailored to their circumstances.

We are also helping an increasing number of families with disabled children. As many as 6% of UK children have some form of disability, and parents are frequently unaware of the practical support that may be available.

The difference your gift will make

We need over half a million pounds every year to fund our work. None of this comes from central government, so we are dependent upon the generosity of our supporters and our commercial projects.

Gifts left in people's wills are especially important and responsible for our being able to provide a free helpline. Many people assume that such gifts must be large sums of money, but this is not the case. Gifts left to the DLF have ranged from under £100 to tens of thousands of pounds.


Why you should make and review a will

Making a will is important because it enables you to decide how your estate will be divided and your affairs dealt with.


Without a will, the division of your estate is governed by the laws of intestacy. These take no account of personal wishes. A will is, therefore, one of the most significant documents to which you can put your name.

If you already have a will, it is advisable to review it every five years or whenever major changes occur in your life.
